1. B – She believed it was not yet the right time to make her wish.

The text explains that Grandma had taught April that every wish has its own perfect moment. April whispers, "Not yet," because she is waiting for the right time before making her wish.

2. A – She could predict the first snowfall and knew when the swallows would return.

4. C – Confused or mixed up.

The sentence explains that Grandma sometimes forgot names and misplaced memories. Therefore, *muddled* means that her memories had become confused or mixed up.

5. B – It had blown away in the wind.

A strong gust of wind swept across the hillside and the dandelion slipped from April's fingers, causing her to chase after it.

6. D – Wishes begin when people notice opportunities and take action.

The gardener explains that wishes do not simply come true by hoping. Instead, they begin when people open their eyes, notice what they can do, and take positive action to help others.

7. A – Volunteers were repairing an old wooden bench and neighbours were helping an elderly couple.

These actions show members of the community working together and helping one another, which demonstrates kindness and care.

8. C – She realised that although she couldn't fix everything, she could still make a positive difference.

After speaking with the gardener, April understands that she cannot restore Grandma's

memory completely, but she can improve Grandma's garden and bring happiness through kindness.

9. B – Hopeful.

By the end of the story, April no longer wishes for impossible things. Instead, she hopes for more kindness and happy memories, showing that she has become optimistic and positive about the future.

10. D – Small acts of kindness can make a meaningful difference, even when we cannot solve everything.

Throughout the story, the villagers and April demonstrate that while they cannot fix every problem, simple acts of kindness can improve people's lives and create hope. This is the central message of the text.
